Visual Memphis: So, what's the exhibition all about?

Nasty Women Memphis: We are a group exhibition that serves to demonstrate the solidarity among artists who identify with being a Nasty Woman in the face of threats to roll back women's rights, individual rights and reproductive rights. Our exhibit also serves as a fundraiser to support organizations defending these rights and to echo the platform for organization after the Trump Presidential inauguration in January. Proceeds from the sales made at the Nasty Women Memphis Exhibition will be donated to Planned Parenthood.

Visual Memphis: How did the exhibition come to be? Is it connected to the recent - and highly successful - Nasty Women Exhibition in NYC?

Nasty Women Memphis: Nasty Women Memphis is one of forty other exhibits around the country (and some outside of the country) created as the result of the NYC exhibition. A few months back, I read an article about the New York Nasty Women call for artists and went to their site to submit a piece. Once I began reading, I found a page for those interested in creating a Nasty Women show in their own city. I immediately sent in an email for more information about setting up a show in Memphis. At the same time, a lovely woman named Chelle Ellis was also emailing about starting an exhibit in Memphis. It has been a great pairing! Chelle, myself and Chelle's husband, Kenny, have been working hard to make the Nasty Women Memphis the best that it can be

Visual Memphis: Based on the work you've seen that is going into the exhibition, what types of stories are local "nasty women" planning to share with us?

Nasty Women Memphis: We have had such an incredible response to this exhibition! Chelle and I could not believe the number of Nasty Women and Nasty Women supporters that show an interest in exhibiting work with us. The pieces are as varied and individual as the artists themselves. Some are dark and abstract while others are bright and colorful. The artworks showcase a wide variety of mediums including painting, sculpture and video.

Some of the recurring subjects deal with calls for gender equality, questions of what it means to be feminine, changing the social code on how society views women and, of course, pieces demonstrating concerns over the works and actions of our newly elected President Trump.

The main message that all of our artists share is one of unity and equality. Our artists demonstrate how, when we come together, we can make a difference to truly change social injustices and make strides toward the end of gender inquality.

Visual Memphis: Will the show be family friendly?

Nasty Women Memphis: We do have pieces containing nudity and serious content matter that may not be suitable for young viewers. Parents should use their own judgement when it comes to their little ones.

Visual Memphis: Any other details that we should know about in advance of the exhibition? Nasty Women Memphis: There will be free food and drinks for those who attend. We even have a beer being brewed specifically for our show! Please note that there is also a closing reception on Saturday, February 18, 6-9pm. We will again be serving refreshments, and some of the exhibiting artists will give brief artist talks about their work.
